DR. ANDREW T. WOLFF is an associate professor at Dickinson College in the Political Science and International Studies departments. From 2018 to 2020, he is serving as Dickinson College's Resident Director of the European Studies Program in Bologna, Italy. He received his doctorate in International Relations from Johns Hopkins University's School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). He has a Bachelor of Arts degrees in Politics and European History from Washington and Lee University. His primary research interests are European security issues, NATO enlargement, transatlantic relations, geopolitical theory, American foreign policy, and international diplomacy. His publications have appeared in the Journal of Transatlantic Studies, Contemporary Security Policy, the Journal of Contemporary European Studies, International Peacekeeping and International Affairs.

PROF. DR. ULRICH FRANKE is a member of the Institute for Intercultural and International Studies (InIIS) at the University of Bremen since 2011 and hired as stand-in professor for the academic year 2018–19. With a thesis on NATO's persistence after the end of block confrontation, Ulrich received his doctorate in political science from the University of St. Gallen in Switzerland in 2008. Like the courses he teaches, his research mostly deals with aspects of world order – international organizations and their relations as well as foreign policy of Western countries.
