My dear Mr. Dady:

I transmit herewith for your information a copy of proceedings of a court-martial that was convened at this school on April the 21st to try John Bear, together with a letter I have just addressed to his mother.

I want to state further that the Hazel Myers with whom Bear associated was found dead on the outskirts of Carlisle several weeks ago and that a coroner's jury pronounced it a case of murder, so that he was not locked up any too soon in our guard-house to escape being mentioned in connection with that case.

Regretting that so unfavorable a report has to be conveyed to you and hoping that there may be some means whereby he can be compelled to make an effort to do better, I am, Very respectfully, 24

I transmit herewith for your information a copy of proceedings of a court-martial that was held at this school on April the 21st to try your sen for serious offenses. On May the 8th the findings of the court were approved by the Cormissioner of Indian Affairs and I was sutherised to expel your son.

In accordance with such authority arrangements are being made to have him leave here this evening. Transportation for his passage to Bayfield will be procured for his use and I would thank you to arrange so that an amount of \$25.12 will be sent to me to pay for the ticket.

It is to be regretted that such information has to be conveyed to you, but because your son would not make use of his time he is not desirable as a student.

He has probably explained to you by this time that he was taken to williamsport. Pennsylvania, to appear as a witness in cases against several negroes from whom he and other boys of similar reputation had secured liquor. His every action here seems to have been directed toward the very worst acts he could possibly become connected with.
