

Death of Henry Bradley.

This Saturday morning the college community was much affected to hear of the death of Henry Bradley, the faithful colored janitor of Dickinson College, which occurred on Friday night.

The deceased had been collecting for a number of weeks with various pecuniaries. He was aged 67 years, a native of Winchester, Va., where he was slave until the emancipation, when he came to this town. He enlisted with the "Old Negro" colored troops, and served until the close of the war. He then engaged at his trade of stone mason in Carlisle, and 10 years ago became janitor at Dickinson College, where he served faithfully until his death. He was much beloved by the students and children among the old college faculty, with the cheerful name of "Brad." His home was in corner of the basement of "East College," where his wife and he looked after the wants of the boys who resided in "West College," over which section "Brad" was janitor.

The wife and three children survive, viz.: Mrs. Alexander Duvman, of this place; W. H. Bradley, of New York City and Shirley A. Bradley, of this place.

The classes of the college all passed resolutions on his death, and on Monday afternoon all college work was suspended and the students might pay their last respects to his funeral. The sorrow expressed at his death is a sign of the high esteem all felt for this poor, honest and faithful man. For many years he had been known as professor of "Bellology" at Dickinson.
