Philadelphia County had the largest percent minority population among all of Pennsylvania's counties, with 61.0 percent, while Dauphin, Monroe and Delaware followed, each with more than one-quarter of their population from a minority group. Every county has seen population growth in its minority population since 2000.

Pennsylvania and its counties have become more diverse than ever before, according to 2008 U.S. Census Bureau population estimates, released recently. The overall minority population has grown to $2,313,796$ people in 2008, representing 18.6 percent of the state's population.

The fastest-growing minority group in Pennsylvania was the Hispanic or Latino population: the county with the fastestgrowing Hispanic or Latino population was Luzerne County, with 274.7 percent growth since 2000.

Pennsylvania's population has grown slowly but consistently since the last Census: the state added 167,227 people, a 1.4 percent increase over 2000. Most of that population growth accounted to Latinos.

There are Latinos in all of Pennsylvania's 67 counties. There are 593,986 Latino residents in the state.

Pennsylvania's population continues to grow older, with the median age increasing to 39.9, up from 38.0 in 2000. Pennsylvania is ranked third in the nation in the percent of its population that is 65 or older, but 43rd in the percent that is under 18. However, Latinos are the youngest population in Pennsylvania with a median age of 27.
