

HISTORY OF THE BLUEGRASS ON THE GRASS FESTIVAL

The roots of Dickinson's Bluegrass on the Grass Festival can be traced to bluegrass barn parties on the farm of Davis Tracy, who was the Director of the Dickinson College Counseling Center and an advisor to the college radio station WDCV. At one of these gatherings, bluegrass pioneers Hazel Dickens and Alice Gerrard played, and Tracy's Dickinson colleagues were so impressed that they encouraged him to organize a summer bluegrass concert on campus.

In July 1996, Davis and his band Country Bob and the Barbeque Boys, along with the Penn-Del Mountain Boys and the Fox Family, performed for a crowd of about 200. After this debut, the festival quickly grew in size and eventually moved to its present site in front of Bosler Hall and the historic Old West building. Today, the festival is a regional event drawing more than 4,000 music enthusiasts.

Bluegrass on the Grass is known for having a diverse mix of artists ranging from traditional bluegrass, olde time music, and "new" bluegrass. Since the initial festival, The Dismembered Tennesseans have been a regular staple of the festival.

Bluegrass on the Grass has also showcased a number of major bluegrass acts over the years such as Lynn Morris (International Bluegrass Music Association 1996 Song of the Year), Blue Highway (IBMA 2008 Song of the Year), Butch Baldassari & Mike Bubb (2008 IBMA bass player of the year), Dale Ann Bradley (2009 IBMA female vocalist of the year), The Claire Lynch Band (2010 IBMA Female Vocalist of the Year), Junior Sisk & Ramblers Choice (IBMA 2013 Male Vocalist of the Year), the Steep Canyon Rangers (2013 Grammy for Best Bluegrass Album), Frank Solivan & Dirty Kitchen (2014 IBMA Instrumental Group of the Year), Special Consensus (2014 IBMA Recorded Event of the Year), Michael Cleveland & Flamekeeper (three time IBMA Instrumental Group of the Year), and Russell Moore & IIIrd Tyme Out (five time IBMA Male Vocalist of the Year).

This non-profit festival is organized by volunteers. Dickinson College

hosts the festival, contributes annual seed funding, and provides substantial logistical support for the event. Other contributions come from more than 200 private donors, program advertisements for Carlisle-area businesses, festival vendors, and Sponsor Ticket sales on the day of the event. These contributions, along with our volunteers, make this celebration possible every year and allow organizers to pay the bluegrass musicians, provide them with first-class housing, and feed them during the festival.

Additional support comes from the record companies that represent the performers. These companies donate music CDs to be given away to festival attendees who purchase Sponsor Tickets. Record companies supporting the festival this year are Patuxent Music, Rebel Records, Mountain Fever Records, Cassell Tunes, Mile Twelve Band, and Michael Cleveland for Compass Records.

The Martin Guitar Company of Nazareth, Pennsylvania has been a long-term partner of Bluegrass on the Grass by donating one of its guitars to a lucky Sponsor Ticket holder.

IN MEMORIUM FLETCHER BRIGHT



Fletcher Bright (1931-2017) was the most influential catalyst for Bluegrass on the Grass and the concert you are enjoying today. He was a beloved and well-known musician, teacher, and string band supporter.

As a musician, Fletcher had accomplished an amazing feat—keeping his high school bluegrass band together for 72 years! The Dismembered Tennesseans were

formed when Bright was at the McCallie School in Chattanooga. A natural and enthusiastic entertainer, Fletcher kept audiences all over the country in stitches whenever they performed.

Fletcher was a successful businessman who joined his father's real estate firm in 1953, and his son George now manages the company, which builds and maintains shopping centers throughout the southeastern U.S. Fletcher generously shared his wealth with others who needed it. In the bluegrass and fiddle music world, organizers of festivals and camps always knew that he would pitch in to help when finances were stretched thin, and he was especially warm to young musicians trying to master their instruments. He never looked for credit for his generosity; he simply wanted the music and the learning to continue, and it has.

Fletcher set up a scholarship for Berklee College of Music students playing and studying roots music. According to Matt Glaser, the director of Berklee's American Roots program, Bright was one of America's best straight-ahead, old-school-style bluegrass fiddlers and a fine ragtime and stride pianist. In 2005, he received the Tennessee Governor's Award in the Arts in the Tennessee Folklife Heritage category.

Fletcher Bright was a friend to everyone in the bluegrass world, especially other fiddlers. He studied their music and often attended camps himself to learn at the feet of the best.

The Bluegrass on the Grass staff honors Fletcher Bright's history as a musician, teacher and promoter of young stringed instrument musicians by naming

I was born and raised in Newark, Delaware, and have been attending bluegrass jams, festivals, kid's academies, and concerts for as long as I can remember. Both of my parents are musicians. My mom plays the piano, flute, and clarinet. My dad plays guitar, banjo, and mandolin. I play the fiddle, banjo, guitar, mandolin, and piano, and I also love to sing.

My musical mentors are Ken Gehret, Steve Field, and Ira Gitlin. Ken is an old friend of my dad's and is one of the most accomplished multi-instrumentalists I have ever met. At the age of five, I met both Steve and Ira when I first began attending the Kid's Academy at the Delaware Valley Bluegrass Festival held in Woodstown, New Jersey.

These days, my musical learning comes from listening to recordings and watching YouTube videos. I have played classical music in school orchestras and chamber groups, so I can sight-read music. I find it to be a valuable skill, no matter what genre of music I am performing.

Musicians that have influenced me include Bill Monroe, Earl Scruggs, Tony Rice, Danny Paisley, Del McCoury, Ricky Skaggs, The Lonesome River Band, Doyle Lawson, and Tim O'Brien. In particular, I pay close attention to the following fiddle players: Bobby Hicks, T.J. Lundy, Jason Carter, Aubrey Haynie, Alison Krauss, and Michael Cleveland. Since February 2023, I have been the fiddle player for the Across the Track Bluegrass Band, based in northern Maryland. I also give private strings lessons at my home in Newark, Delaware.

I am a recent graduate from the Cab Calloway School of the Arts in Wilmington, DE, and I will be attending the University of Delaware in the fall as a Cognitive Science major, specializing in Pre-Professional Speech and Language Pathology.

THE DISMEMBERED TENNESSEANS were formed by famed east Tennessee fiddler and philanthropist Fletcher Bright with his school friends at Chattanooga's McCallie High School in 1947. "Singing from the heart through the nose' is an apt description of our group," says Ed "Doc" Cullis, an original member.

One of the most influential bluegrass bands in the region, THE **DISMEMBERED TENNESSEANS** played, sang, and laughed their way across the country for more than 70 years and through numerous personnel changes until Fletcher's passing on Christmas Day 2017. To some, it seemed that the band had finally run its course, but fate had other plans.

In spring 2019, original member Doc Cullis (banjo) and long-time band alumni Laura Walker (bass and vocals) and Don Cassel (mandolin and vocals) formed **THE NEW DISMEMBERED TENNESSEANS**, welcoming three new members. Since then, the band has new energy and a new sense of purpose. Its repertoire honors Fletcher and the original band, and aims its music headlong into the future.

Appealing to traditional and progressive acoustic music fans alike, **THE RUTA BEGGARS** combine bluegrass and early swing to create a timeless act filled with intricate vocal harmonies, fiery instrumentals, and plenty of fun. Since 2018 they have brought the joy of their live show to audiences across the US and Canada—from festival stages to storied folk listening rooms and as support for legacy acts Lyle Lovett and Ricky Skaggs.

They have been praised for their creative yet tasteful arrangements and charming performances, winning Thomas Point's band competition in 2019.

Mining the fertile common ground between bluegrass, early country music, and traditional mountain music, **THE ALUM RIDGE BOYS & ASHLEE** are Virginia's torchbearers of the old-time sound. Their powerful harmony singing and energetic instrumentals have captivated audiences around the globe and helped the band to win many awards including blue ribbons in the old time band contest at the 85th Annual Old Fiddlers' Convention in Galax, Virginia and the bluegrass band contest at the 51st Mount Airy Fiddlers' Convention in North Carolina.

Band members have won a slew of individual awards as well, including first prize in the 29th Annual MerleFest Chris Austin Songwriting Contest. Deep appreciation for traditional music enables the band to craft tasteful original songs and instrumentals that blend seamlessly alongside the classics.

The world tends to look at accomplishments in the form of accolades and, although only in his mid-30's, 2020 GRAMMY winner Michael Cleveland has plenty to his credit. He started taking fiddle lessons at age four and by age nine he was invited to sit in with the legendary Bill Monroe at the Bean Blossom Bluegrass Festival. Soon after, he brought his virtuosic style to the Grand Ole Opry as a guest of Alison Krauss, and was handpicked for the International Bluegrass Music Association's (IBMA) Bluegrass Youth Allstars at 13. Since then he has been named an 11-time winner of the International Bluegrass Music Association's Fiddle Performer of the Year award.

When Michael formed **MICHAEL CLEVELAND & FLAMEKEEPER** in 2006, he found the right vehicle and the right partners for his musical vision. He and the band haven't rested since. Michael and the talented Flamekeepers present a program of tight vocal trios and duos, blistering instrumentals, and fiddle-and-banjo duets that echo the first-generation stars of bluegrass.
