Begins sunset of Friday, October 9
Ends nightfall of Saturday, October 10

★ **SIMCHAT TORAH**

Begins sunset of Saturday, October 10
Ends nightfall of Sunday, October 11

CHANUKAH

Begins sunset of Thursday, December 10
Ends nightfall of Friday, December 18
Occurs during Winter Break

TU BISHVAT

Begins sunset of Wednesday, January 27
Ends nightfall of Thursday, January 28

PURIM

Begins sunset of Thursday, February 25
Ends nightfall of Friday, February 26

D ★ PASSOVER

Begins sunset of Saturday, March 27
Ends nightfall of Sunday, April 4
*Yom Tov is observed March 28-29 and April 3-4
Only the first night of Passover is observed by the College*

YOM HASHOAH

Begins sunset of Wednesday, April 7
Ends nightfall of Thursday, April 8

★ **SHAVUOT**

Begins sunset of Sunday, May 16
Ends nightfall of Tuesday, May 18

DICKINSON COLLEGE RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY POLICY

The college (offices and departments) will not schedule public and/or college-wide events on the following major religious holidays: Rosh HaShanah, Yom Kippur, the first night of Passover, Eid-al-Fitr, and Eid-al-Adha. The college calendar already excludes events on Christmas and Easter. Students must make arrangements with their faculty members in advance when an exam (including quizzes), papers, and other work are due on major religious holidays. A student will not be penalized for missing class or not handing in work on a holiday due to religious observance. However, students must notify faculty, in writing, reasonably in advance of the holiday if they will be absent from class for religious observance. Likewise, students who observe these holidays must notify, in advance, their coaches should they have athletic practice or scheduled competition at a time of religious observance. While faculty and staff are expected to be sensitive to the needs of observant students of all faiths when planning lectures, field trips, work and other curricular activity that might conflict with observance of a major religious holiday, any course work or other obligation that is missed remains the student's responsibility to complete. Faculty members are expected to make reasonable arrangements for students to complete missed work; students must make up the work. *For questions, contact Rabbi Marley Weiner.*
